



# The First 10 Years...Insert Pandemic Here... The Next 10 Years!

In 2005, Paul Ciener's endowment purchased 7 acres of property in the

Historic District of downtown Kernersville, NC, along with a deserted Dairy Queen and an abundance of weeds. Planning, clearing, grading and the beginning of several garden displays shortly followed. In 2011, the Garden officially opened with a grand display centered around 25,000 spring blooming tulips and daffodils.

Since then, we are proud to share how much we've grown. Thousands of visitors have come to watch over of 20 individual displays come to life. Among those displays are the Pattern Garden, Tropical Garden, Xeric Scree, Ginkgo Screen, Kitchen Garden, Hillside Boulder Garden, the Japanese Garden Vignette and more. Over the last 10 years, the garden has offered classes, lectures, concerts, plant sales, blood drives, a Christmas light show, and so much more. Garden staff and volunteer docents toured hundreds of school-aged groups and led them through the gardens to educate them how plants adapt. While here, they sampled vegetables grown in the kitchen garden, admired the pollinators and took home a seed kit. Adults alike shared the same experience, sans the seed kit, but saw the diversity of the displays and plant collections.

There has been so much to highlight during the last 10 years but, donating over 5500 pounds of produce to area food relief programs, installing the upside down tree or flower tower, showcasing Pearl Fryar's trained Topiary trees, watching 2 agave or century plants completing their life cycles, and hosting 2 Boy Scout Groups for their designated projects certainly take center stage. We have made great strides with offering unique programs along with unique plants and gifts through our plant and gift shop sales. There was a lot of focus and excitement moving into our 10th year. But then the pandemic hit and while we tried to celebrate, the world had gone crazy, and operations disappeared for a while. The Garden Displays remained open, and not only did we find ourselves with a

reduced income, but also succumbed to plant theft and trash left behind. Garden Staff kept their cool and continued to remain positive, we spoke often of the mission and delivered a world class garden. We soon realized that we are not alone, and we have great support from friends, members, and the community.

So, how do we celebrate 10 years during a pandemic? There has been a lot of sitting and waiting followed by doing what we do but doing it safely. Thankfully, our primary focus is to Inspire, Enlighten and Connect all visitors to the world of plants. Our livelihood is having quality displays whether they are the tulips in spring or the 60+ different varieties of Japanese Maples in the Japanese Garden. We are doing what we do during a pandemic and as a non-profit organization, we are finding ways to stay afloat. Also, during this time, there has been staff changes and one of our most engaging programs offered was the Movie on the Lawn. Kristin Hennig, Programs Officer, spearheaded this project in partnership with a/perture cinema. The comments afterwards were "When is the next one?" The movie took place in the Event Lawn where members and visitors watched a British movie "Greenfingers". Everyone was spread out safely, we had wine, beer, pizza and popcorn, and guess what, we are planning the next one.

The Spectacular Holiday Bloom is quickly becoming the second best time to see our garden. The lights will be bigger and better than last year. Volunteers have made their way back to help process and assemble recycle water bottles into a symphony of color and light. Plans are well under way to host a safe, Small Business Saturday with Vendors from across the triad, to engage families with Santa, and to offer a Wreath Decorating Workshop. Of course, as a non-profit, we are following all guidelines and will continue to adapt where necessary.

with Professor Tony Fragola


# Wednesdays, October 6 - November 17, 3:30-4:45pm (no class October 20) \$120 / \$100 for PJCBG members

Allium - Plant Profile Adrienne R. Roethling, Director

It's the time of year to plan and plant bulbs for Spring. Here in central North Carolina, we can begin planting bulbs now for the spring and continue planting well into December as long as the grounds are not frozen. Bulbs need 6-8 weeks in the ground in order to emerge and perform well. Most bulbs begin emerging and blooming in late March all throughout the month of April.

One of my favorite spring blooming bulbs are *Allium* or ornamental onions. Most *Allium* peak after tulips and daffodils extending your spring bulb displays. Hurry up and order your *Alliums* now because they are selling fast. Our friends at Brent and Becky's Bulbs have already sold out of several varieties. Ornamental onions are best suited in full sun gardens and perfect to plant among lower growing perennials. They are strong performers giving you great return from year to year. If I haven't sold you on them just yet, they are also pest resistant. The onion flavor of the bulb deters voles, squirrels, and chipmunks while the tops are unappealing to rabbit or deer. As I type this, I do hope no one has experienced

this.



'Globemaster' or Allium giganteum are taller varieties. Flowering stems reach 4-5' tall. They perform well above a blanket of hardy geranium, dianthus, through lambs' ear and more. Flower heads are rather tight, about the size of a softball, producing a lavender purple color. A white

flower form exists for those not in favor of purple. *Allium christophii* produce a shorter stalk but a wider flower head. It's an explosion of purple and I'm equally attracted to the dried seed head afterwards. Come July,






heads are cut, and spray painted in time to celebrate and decorate for the 4th of July holiday. 'Summer Drummer' is a variety of ornamental onion that is too, 4' tall but a much smaller flower

head. The flower is about the size of a golf ball producing a mauve purple color that flowers in June.

Be sure to order through the Bloomin' Bucks with Brent and Becky's Bulbs program. Bloomin' Bucks is a fundraiser which supports non-profit organizations. Because PJCBG registered for the program, visitors can now come to the gardens, look at our displays and jot down their favorite bulb companions or combinations. At



As a reward, 25% of their purchases will come back to the garden.







October 2021 Garden Tip

As we enter fall, the work of the gardener transitions. Instead of

dragging hoses and staying cool in the summer heat, we find ourselves staying on top of falling leaves, cutting back dried/desiccated plant parts, and planting cool season vegetables and annuals. During this time of fall maintenance, make sure your landscape and plant materials are 'living' to their full potential.

Many plants that form large flower heads not only look attractive when going to seed (e.g. Sunflowers, Echinacea) also have a tremendous ecological benefit to many wildlife species. Consider collecting the heads of these flowers and adding them to your outdoor containers, giving bugs and birds plenty to eat in a season of limited food sources. The same goes for ornamental grasses and plants that produce yearly canes or limbs that desiccate back to the ground -





instead of throwing them away or tossing them into your compost pile, use them

in wrapped bundles or winter thatch fences. Give your landscape another layer of interest and allow the beneficial insects that lay eggs and over winter these materials the best shot possible at continuing their work in your garden.
